Canada's Old Age Security (OAS) pension is a monthly payment available to most Canadians 65 or older, regardless of work history. It's not a program that Canadians pay into directly, rather it is funded out of the Canadian Government's general revenues. Service Canada automatically enrolls all Canadian citizens and residents who are eligible for pension benefits and sends a notific
