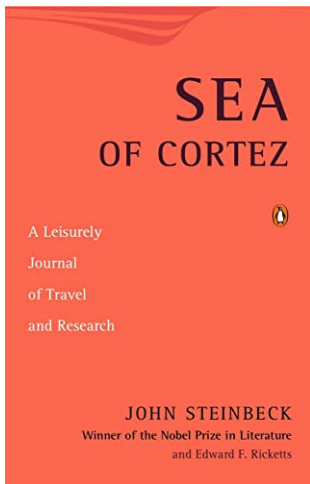

Ed Ricketts was a marine biologist who was the inspiration for "Doc" in *Cannery Row*. This was a voyage that started in Monterey Bay on the California coast and went down along Baja California into the Sea of Cortez. Born in Salinas, California, in 1902, John STEINBECK grew up in a fertile agricultural valley about twenty-five miles from the Pacific Coast—and both valley and coast would serve as settings for some of his best fiction. In 1919 he went to Stanford University, where he intermittently enrolled in literature and writing courses until he left in 1925 without taking a degree. During the next five years he supported himself as a laborer and journalist in New York City and then as a caretaker for a Lake Tahoe estate, all the time working on his first novel, *Cup of Gold* (1929). *Travels with Charley in Search of America*. *America and Americans*. *Journal of a Novel: The East of Eden Letters*. *Working Days: The Journals of The Grapes of Wrath*. *PLAYS*. *Of Mice and Men*. The book outlines the details of their six-week specimen-collecting trip that took them from Monterey all the way to the Gulf of California. In 1951, the narrative log section of the book was republished as *The Log from the Sea of Cortez*, and Viking removed Ricketts as a co-author. Controversy remains over Steinbeck's approval of this deletion, as he had previously been adamant about crediting Ricketts. Large segments of the narrative portion are directly lifted from Ricketts's journal.
